If you're into stunning landscapes, big steaks, passionate people and (sometimes late nights) spent drinking fine wines, then Argentina is for you.

With its gorgeous landscapes, cosmopolitan cities and lively culture, it's a traveller's paradise. Almost the same size as India, Argentina stretches almost 3500km from Bolivia to the tip of South America.

You can conquer the Patagonian steppe, climb South America's highest peak, visit the thousands of penguins and bask in the beauty of some of the world's most amazing waterfalls – and you can play golf.

While it may be better known as the home of Maradona, Batistuta, Messi and Tévez, football-mad Argentina also has a soft spot for golf. The country boasts over 300 golf courses – and three of them have been ranked among the top 100 courses in the world by Golf Digest in the US – many of them highlighted by the beautiful surrounding landscapes of plains bordered by rivers, natural waterways in the Buenos Aires plain, the Atlantic Coast (which makes for some great links), the

vineyards in Mendoza, the amazing Patagonia, and the stunning landscape of the Mountains of Cordoba.

City lovers will adore fabulous Buenos Aires, the elegant and busy capital that represents the Argentine essence. In spite of its modern constructions and dynamic activity, it has managed to preserve old traditions and charming character. Visitors are fascinated by its environment, the individuality of each of its neighbourhoods, the cordiality of its people, and its wide selection of cultural and commercial opportunities. All of this makes for a pretty good base for the visiting golfer. And outside of Buenos Aires, the land of the Pampas begins and many towns with historical centres that go back to colonial are worth visiting.

Argentine beef is world-famous for good reason. Usually vying for top spot in the meat-eaters of the world ranking, Argentina is not the type of place you want to be a vegetarian in. Definitely check out Argentine barbecue – an asado, or sometimes also called parrillada, because it is made on a

parrilla, or grill. "Lomo" (tenderloin) and bife de chorizo are excellent.

"Costillas" (ribs) are considered by the natives to be the real grilling meat cut and is very tasty. In the more populated areas, parrilladas are available on the street from small carts and barbecue trailers along the footpath. Skewers and steak sandwiches can then be purchased to go. Given that a large portion of Argentines are of Italian, Spanish and French

descent, such fare is very widespread and of high quality.

One thing that may take some diners by surprise is that it is not uncommon in Argentina to treat pasta and sauce as separate items. You will see the pastas for one price and then the sauces for an additional charge.

Argentina is safe, friendly and – compared to Irish or European destinations – very affordable, once you've paid for the flights.
